

This worksheet is lots of fun and is for basic students who need to remember and drill question and answer patterns. This works in large classes with lots of people. I used it in a class with four students. In that case we just made up names for the blank name spaces.

How to use the worksheet.

1. **Show** the students how to set up their ships on the board and to fill in the names on the sheet.

EVERYONE should have their names in the same order.

2. **Students** ask questions based on the verbs in the top row. (Page one lets you use the verbs I've filled in for you, page two lets you use the verbs that you choose.) **Practice** the questions and answers with your students.
