Since vs For

This is a great sheet which basically has a lot of examples of sentences for you to drill with your students. This can be given as homework or done in class with the students orally on the board or individually.

How to use the worksheet.

- 1. **Drill** or elicit some examples with the students. Say them again and again so they recognize the patterns.
- 2. Give the worksheet to students to try the first part. Check their answers and repeat them in a drill over and over again.
- 3. The second part of the worksheet asks students to recognize and correct any errors they spot. By now, students should recognize the patterns and know when something isn't correct.
- 4. Check their answers and drill the patterns again.

Note:

This sheet should NOT take a long time. It's essentially an extended drill. To save time, try giving it to the students as homework the night before.

The second part is great for practicing the difference between simple past: "I went there last week" and present perfect: "I've been there twice this week."

These are actually very easy to distinguish if practiced correctly. I went there twice last week, last month, last year, in 2009, in December. (These are all **finished** times.)

I've been there twice this week, this month, this year, since 2009, since December

(These are all **unfinished** times.)
