Using the worksheet

Valentine's Day can be a fun discussion topic for exploring culture and how it's celebrated differently in each country. Obviously, use care when talking about things like dating. Know your students and their level of comfort or interest in the topic.

Take care:

The language on the first page is more challenging than the conversations on page two.

Warm up and finish with open conversations about related topics such as the perfect date, Valentine's Day in their country, how they met their husband or wife, etc.

1. Read the first conversation as your students listen.

Variation: Have two of the students read while others listen and report.

- 2. Ask follow-up questions and confirm understanding.
- 3. Practice and drill the key sentence patterns as necessary.
- **4.** Discussion. Have students talk about themselves.

Variation: Have students talk about characters in a TV show or movie so they don't have to talk about their private lives if they don't want to.

Variation: Introduce the culture of Valentine's Day with some idioms or articles about the holiday. For business people, search for stories related to the business of Valentine's Day with product sales numbers, investments, advertising, or product reviews.
