- **A:** That's a good point but I think it will happen in the next ten years.
- **B:** I hope you're right.



### Agree or disagree with a specific point.

My team has amazing defense.	That's a good point	but	they have weak offense.
The movie made lots of money.	You have a point		it also got bad reviews.
Change takes time.	I see what you mean	however	we can't wait forever.
This plan will help us.	l hear you		only in the short-term.



- A: I love this movie. It's so good.
- **B:** Are you serious? I totally disagree.
- A: What!? Why?
- **B:** It's *so* old and it's *so* slow.
- **A:** You have a point. It *is* slow but it's also *really* popular.
- **B:** I hear you.
- A: Well, what movie do you like?
- **B:** Actually, I like the remake.
- A: What!? But you don't like the original!
- **B:** Thats's true but the new one is faster and it has better special effects.
- A: I see what you mean.



General Lesson Plan		
Greeting and <i>brief</i> introduction for new students  Topical warm-up conversation (Choose <b>one</b> ) best or worst <i>movie</i> of all time / negotiations / disagreeing (works great as its own topic)  Needs analysis: Teacher notes down key patterns / phrases from the students' speaking <i>Brief</i> error correction, drill, and pattern reinforcement		
Listening: Conversation one  Ask comprehension questions (repeat for listening or pronunciation issues)  Students read and practice in pairs  Students practice without looking		
Key Speaking point: Agreeing and Disagreeing  Discuss situations where you need to disagree (negotiations at work / sharing fun opinions about light topics)		
Find out: Students work in pairs to practice disagreeing or agreeing. Switch partners and repeat Variation: Students report back about their partners	5 - 10 min	
Brief review Assign homework Closing and salutations	5 min	

#### **Helpful hint:**

Some students are uncomfortable disagreeing due to their culture or personal experience.

Make them comfortable by setting up realistic ways to disagree. Anyone with even a little work experience needs to be able to disagree in order to handle negotiations, contract agreements, sales, planning meetings, or setting budgets and goals.

For people without experience try setting it up as fun banter between two friends talking about the greatest or worst movie or game.
